The Great East Japan Earthquake

- Happened on 11th March 2011, at 2.46pm JST (Japan Standard Time), a 9.0 magnitude Earthquake broke out.
- Triggered massive tsunami up to 15 meters which hit the Eastern coast of Japan.
- Led to the Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Power Plant disaster.
